Dear Saint John and Epiphany Parishioners,

How disappointed the people must have been! They were coming to hear their Messiah proclaim their freedom! They were coming to hear how He was going to lead them in a revolution against the Roman Empire! Even worse than not starting a revolt against the Romans, He said that they would not even be made happy by becoming richer, enjoying more pleasures and becoming stronger! Instead, He promised poverty, chastity, meekness, mourning, hunger and persecution!

"What a rip off!," they must have screamed! They had walked miles to come and listen to their Savior and Messiah. He was a fake and failure! He wasn't going to save them from anything!

Guess what! In Luke's Gospel, Jesus even goes on to say, after proclaiming the Beatitudes: "Woe to you that are rich. . . Woe to you who are full now. . . Woe to you, when men speak well of you." People must have thought He was some kind of crazy, lunatic! Why would anyone want to become one of His followers? All he seemed to offer was a life of everything they had been wanting to avoid in life.

Today, most of us do not flatly reject the teaching of Jesus, but rather we rationalize and compromise His teaching. We run His teaching through our personal, "what is comfortable/acceptable to me" program and then embark on living out a modified, sometimes unrecognizable version of His teaching.

How many times do we hear folks proclaim that they are Catholic but they still believe that abortion is OK in certain circumstances? Or that they are Catholic but still believe that in their situation they can use artificial birth control? Or that they are Catholic but do not believe they need to tithe to their parish? Or that they are Catholic but will still not invite Aunt Sally to Easter Dinner because they cannot forgive her?

Jesus does invite us to become His followers and He does promise joy, peace and hope. However, His blessings are dependent on our living out His program as faithfully as possible. We can't expect the blessings if we don't follow the program! However, each of us wants to receive the full blessings of the Lord but only by living out my modified Catholic program.

Jesus gave us His life, completely and totally. He expects us to give Him our lives, completely and totally. In exchange, He has promised us a new life in Him. For over two thousand years, we have the testimony and witness of people of have taken Him up on His offer. They say it works! We call them Saints!

Prince Rastislav of Greater Moravia asks Emperor Michael III for a Bishop and teacher to be sent "to explain to them the true Christian faith in their own language"

First Trip to Slavic Lands

- Cyril and Methodius are sent
- 863 Arrive in Greater Moravia
- Various Slav peoples are there
- Take texts of Sacred Scripture with them for use in the Sacred Liturgy
- They had translated them into Old Slavonic
- Written in a new alphabet that is now named "Cyrillic" after St. Cyril

Trip to Rome

- 866 travel to Rome
- Pass through Venice and come under fire for innovating

you need.





Home Study Prize Challenge

Here is how it works:

- To be eligible you must be at least High School age (14-19) and under 150 years old.
- The first 30 high school students and the first thirty adults to register will be accepted.
- Registration consists of picking up your packet, a \$10 fee for materials, and completing the application.
- You begin your study immediately. Approximately one month after sign ups are completed, a question/answer meeting will be scheduled, and thereafter every 6 to 8 weeks.
- One year from now, in February, 2012, a two-part test will be scheduled. The first part is an open book test on Scripture. The second part will be a closed book, written essay exam of two pages minimum, five pages maximum to be completed in 3 hours on the saint of your choice.
- Your identity will be secret. The tests will be graded and scored within six weeks and the winners announced.
- First prize requires a minimum score of 85, and the other awards require a minimum score of 70.
- There will be 4 awards for the High School winners and 4 awards for the adults:

1st prize—\$1,500 2nd prize—\$500 3rd prize—\$300 4th prize—\$200



Wednesday, February 2nd, Feast of The Presentation of the Lord

Today the Blessing of Candles will take place at the Noon Mass. Everyone is invited to bring candles with them to Mass that day to have them blessed for personal and family use. Light penetrates the darkness. Jesus is the light of truth in the world. God's Word is a lamp that lights a path for our feet. At our Baptism we received a

lighted candle, along with this charge, "Keep the flame of faith burning in your heart." When the Lord comes may you go out to meet Him with all the saints in the Heavenly Kingdom."

The wax, being spotless, represents Christ's most spotless Body; the wick enclosed in it is an image of His Soul, while the glowing flame typifies the Divine Nature united with the human in one Divine Person.

On the second of February the church celebrates the festival of the Purification of the Blessed Virgin, the day when Jesus was offered in the Temple by Mary, as the Victim who would reconcile God and mankind. The day is often called, Candlemas, the Mass of the Candles. Candles are used in the administration of the Sacraments. It has become customary for Catholic families to have blessed candles in their homes to light for prayer or in times of trouble. Blessed Candles should be lit when the priest comes to the home to bring the Eucharist or to Anoint the Sick.

We light candles to venerate the Saints and ask for their prayers. We light candles praying for a deceased loved one or for someone who is suffering. As the candles continue burning in Church they represent our prayers to heaven.

Thursday, The Feast of Saint Blaise: Blessing of Throats

Saint Blaise was a fourth century bishop in Armenia. We know by tradition that he saved a small boy from choking on a fish bone by his prayers. People through the ages have sought his help, especially those afflicted with ailments of the throat. On February 3rd, the Feast of Saint Blaise, the Church continues her ministry to the sick through the blessing of throats.

This blessing asks God's healing and protection upon the one blessed. Two candles blessed the day before on Candlemas, joined in the form of a cross and usually tied with a red ribbon (as a sign of the martyrdom of St. Blaise), are placed around the throat of each person asking a blessing. The priest then prays, "Through the intercession of St. Blaise, Bishop and Marytr, may God deliver you from every disease of the throat and every other illness: In the name of the Father, and of the Son, + and of the Holy Spirit.
