

From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Saint John and Epiphany Parishioners,

As we have just spent time with family and friends to celebrate the Nativity of the Lord, the Church gives us this beautiful feast of the Holy Family. Jesus, the Second Person of the Holy Trinity, the Word made Flesh, reveals all that is good by His every action, word and thought. Emmanuel, God with us, literally shows us who we are to be; both as individuals and families. Many times, someone will be telling us how to accomplish a particular task, and after a moment of listening, we say, "Just show me how to do it!" God the Father had sent us many instructions from Heaven. Both spoken thru the Prophets and written in Scripture. But He decided that it would be better if He came, lived with us, and showed us, in person, how it is to be done!

First there is FAMILY; Jesus, Mary and Joseph. By choosing beforehand this family of God, He shows us that the important factor is holiness. Mary and Joseph are holy people before they bring Jesus into the world. They are people who are willing both as individual persons and as a couple to do God's will even when they can't understand or if it causes them anguish and suffering. They trust in God's Providence for them. They are a happy family in Him.

Fr. Roch Kereszty wrote in the Texas Catholic this week: "How desperately we all long to find happiness in our lives! This is most evident during the Christmas season. Sumptuous meals are prepared; expensive gifts are exchanged; cheerful reunions of friends and relatives interrupt the boring routine of life. But the greater the expectations before the feast, the worse the after-Christmas blues may become. This happens because our expectations always exceed what this world can deliver. Ironically, the one gift that can satisfy our deepest longings is right here in front of us: the Infant Jesus 'wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger.' All we need to do is take the tiny baby into our arms and look at His face."

If our time with family and friends has left an emptiness and was not what we hoped, then we need to make sure that when we are together we follow the advice of St. Paul in our Second Reading, and as we gather together, we, "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly. . .singing psalms, hymns and spiritual songs with gratitude in your hearts to God. And whatever you do, in word or in deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through Him."

Epiphany Home Blessing

"Epiphany" means "manifestation" and is the celebration of Jesus' manifestation and His glory as Savior to all nations symbolically through the Magi. Epiphany is also a day to share gifts, feast, and bless homes. **Next Sunday**, you can do this home blessing. (The letters stand for "Christ Bless this Home" in Latin and for the names of the Magi: Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar.)

All make the Sign of the Cross.

Head of Household: "Peace be to this house and: to all who dwell here, in the name of the Lord.

All: Blessed be God forever.

Reader: In the beginning was the Word and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came to be through him, and without him nothing came to be.... And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we saw his glory, the glory as of the Father's only Son, full of grace and truth. (John 1:1-3.14)

Using chalk, write above an entrance: **20+C+M+B+13 All:** Lord God of heaven and earth, you revealed your only begotten Son to every nation by the guidance of a star. Bless this house and all who inhabit it. May we be blessed with health, goodness of heart, gentleness and the keeping of your law. Fill us with the light of Christ, that our love for each other may go out to all. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God

The first and most essential truth about Mary is that she is the Mother of God. Mary is the Mother of God because she is the mother of Jesus who is the Son of God. Sacred Scripture reveals this truth about Mary in a couple of passages. First, when the angel Gabriel greeted Mary and declared to her: "Behold...[t]he Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you; therefore the child to be born will be called holy, the Son of God" (Lk 1:31,35). In another passage, Mary's cousin Elizabeth greets her as "the mother of my Lord" (Lk 1:43). Though neither of these passages explicitly refer to Mary as the Mother of God, putting them together it is clear that, if Mary is the mother of the Lord and the Lord is God,

then Mary is the Mother of God.

A mother gives her child the nature that she herself has. Mary gave her human nature to her Son, Jesus. She did not give Jesus his divine nature or his divine person. This was not possible because Mary is not divine. She is a creature, and Jesus is the second person of the Holy Trinity. His divine nature and divine person are aspects of his divinity that always existed. Scripture says, "when the time had fully come, God sent forth his Son, born of a woman" (Gal 4:4). Mary was that woman. She only gave him his human nature, but a woman does not give birth to a nature; she gives birth to a person and in Mary's case that person was divine. Then the second person of the Trinity became man, he "emptied himself...being born in the likeness of men" (Phil 2:7). Mary is the Mother of God because the eternal Son of God emptied himself of all his glory and freely subjected himself to the entire spectrum of human existence, from the moment of conception in the womb of



Mary to his terrible death on the cross. St. Athanasius had a saying: "What was not assumed cannot be redeemed." If Jesus had not fully assumed every aspect of our humanity, then he could not have redeemed us. By proclaiming Mary as truly "Mother of God," we are safeguarding the truth not only about the Incarnation but also about our redemption and bodily resurrection.

Early in the Church's history, there was a controversy over this truth. Some people denied that Mary was the Mother of God. They believed that Jesus Christ was divided into two separate persons, the son of Mary and the eternal Son of the Father. They were willing to call Mary the mother of Christ, because to them Christ was a human person. Others saw the error of this thinking and fought to defend the truth that Christ was a divine

person with two natures, one human and one divine. A council of the Church was called to settle the dispute. In 431 AD at Ephesus, the Church declared that Mary could indeed be called Mother of God, because she gave birth to Jesus, the eternal Son of God. This definition made it clear that Jesus is one person, truly God and truly man. The Church declared that Mary was Theotokos, a Greek word that means "God-bearer" (see CCC 495).

Every year on January 1 we celebrate the gift of Mary's divine motherhood. We remember her humble acceptance of this great gift when the angel Gabriel Came to her and remember her cooperation with the Holy Spirit when he came and overshadowed her. Inspired by her example, we pray: "Father,...[m]ay her prayer, the gift of a mother's love, be your people's joy through all ages. May her response, born of a humble heart, draw your Spirit to rest on your people" (*The Roman Missal*, Opening Prayer). (CCC 466, 495)


